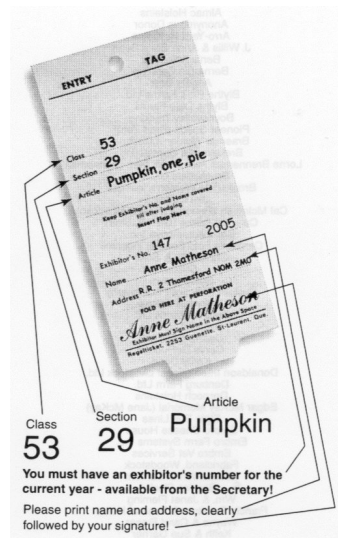


HOME CRAFT DIVISION

1. Membership Fee - \$5.00
2. Read the rules and regulations of the Fair carefully.
3. Fill out the entry form carefully, listing the articles you have entered for competition. Each article must have an entry tag attached to it.
4. All articles for competition must be in the Fair House on Friday (first day of the Fair) **between 8:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m.** *If above time is not suitable, **non-perishable** exhibits can be brought to the Exhibit Hall on Thursday evening, 7:30-8:30pm.*
5. No prizes unless worthy. **☆☆ new or updated classes**
6. All exhibits must be new and the work of the Exhibitor.
7. The Exhibitor is not allowed to show the same article more than twice for judging.
8. No Exhibitor will be allowed more than one entry in the same section of a Class.
9. Our Fair Directors will take every precaution to insure the safety of all articles in our Exhibition Hall, however, they wish the Exhibitors to understand that they must take the risk of exhibiting articles and that should any be accidentally damaged, lost or stolen, the Directors will give every assistance possible toward the recovery of the same, but will not make any payment of the value thereof.
10. Exhibits must not be removed from the Exhibition Hall until after 4:00 p.m. on Monday (last day of the Fair).
11. Any Exhibitor receiving Prize money/GC should pick them up at the Secretary's Office. on Monday of the Fair Weekend.
12. **NEW JUDGING STANDARDS BOOK AVAILABLE.** In March 2009 the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies made available a newly revised edition of "JUDGING STANDARDS FOR FOODS, CLOTHING, QUILTS AND HANDCRAFTS." Copies at a cost of \$5.25 are available from Stormont County Fair office, treasurer, each District Homecraft Chairperson or OAAS Homecraft Chairperson.
13. Points allocated by 1st - 5, 2nd - 4, 3rd - 3, etc. Ties broken by most # of 1st, 2nd, etc.
14. Exhibit Hall Open Saturday - 9 am - 12:30 pm, Closed for Opening of Fair, 1:30 -5 pm; Sunday - 11 am - 5 pm; Monday - 9 am - 3:45 pm. **PICKUP AT 4PM.**

1. Exhibitor shall not exhibit or enter more than one article in each Class.
2. All articles must be new and be the work of the Exhibitor.
3. The Exhibitor is not allowed to show the same article more than twice for judging.
4. S.M.A. means 'Sample Material Attached'.
5. S.Y.A. means 'Sample Yarn Attached'.
6. All articles for competition must be in the Exhibit Hall on Friday (first day of the fair) between 8:30 am and 11:30 am. Absolutely no entries will be accepted after this time. If above time is not suitable, non-perishable exhibits can be brought to the Exhibit Hall on Thursday evening, 7:30-8:30pm.
7. Exhibits must not be removed from the Exhibit Hall until 4:00 pm on Monday (last day of the

Fair).

QUILTS

NOTE: If exhibiting a quilt, you must attach a card listing: the name of the pattern/design and the name of the designer and you will have to follow copyright rules (receive permission from the designer to show this pattern at the fair.) If the quilt design is an old one, it may not have a copyright protection and can be exhibited in the usual way.

Material – Baby yarn or 3-ply fingering 4mm crochet hook

Pattern – TOQUE Chain 3, join with a slip st. to form circle. Rnd 1 – Ch 3, 9dc in circle, sl st in chain 3. Rnd 2 – Ch 3, 1dc in same st., 2dc in each dc (20dc), s1. st. in top of chain
Rnd 3 – Ch 3, 1dc in same st., * 1dc in next, 2dc in next st., repeat from * to end (end with 1dc in next st.) s1. St. in top of chain. Rnd 4 & 5 – Ch 2, 1 sc in each st., s1., St. in top of chain.
Rnd 6 – Ch 3, dc in each st. Rnd 7 – ch3, * 1dc in next st., 2dc in next st., *repeat to end and sl st in top of chain. Rnd 8&9 – Ch 2, sc in each st. to the end. Rnd 10 & 11 – Ch 3, dc in each st. to the end. Rnd 12 & 13 – Same as Rnd 8 Rnd 14 – Ch 2, (sc, ch 1) in each st. to the end. Fasten off. Sew in ends.

BOOTIES: Chain 20 – dc in 4th st. from hook and in each st. across (18 dc) turn.

Rnd 2 – 8 – Ch 3, dc in each st. to the end, turn. (hold this st.) Fold in half and sew end for heel.

Fold the other end with outside edges meeting in the middle & sew across for the tow and up the centre for 4 ridges for the top of the foot. Continuing from last st., for the cuff: ch3

Rnd 1 – 9 dc over the four ridges on each side and join to top of chain. Rnd 2 – Ch 3, 1 dc in each st., and join to top of chain. Rnd 3 & 4 – Ch 2, 1 dc in each st., and join to top of chain. Rnd 5 & 6

– Ch 3, 1dc in each st., and join to top of chain. Rnd 7 – Ch 2 (1sc, ch1) in each st. to the end.

Fasten off. Place ribbon or crochet ties through first row of dc on cuff.

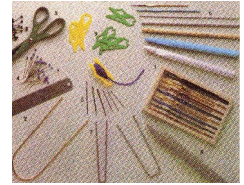

1st - Admission for three adults to Upper Canada Village
2nd - Admission for two adults to Upper Canada Village
3rd - Admission for one adult to Upper Canada Village

Materials : crochet hook size 4 (1mm), 9 (American), no. 20 crochet cotton.

Gauge: 2/5in (6.5 cm) = 30 rows

Pattern: Chain 4

Row 1: 1ch, 1sc. into 1st chain, 3sc. into 2nd chain, 1 sc.

Row 2: 1ch, 1sc. into next 2 sc., 3 sc. into next sc., sc. into next 2sc.,.

Row 3: 1ch, 1 sc. into next 3 sc., 3sc. into next sc., 1sc into next 3sc.

Row 4: " " " " 4sc., " " " " " " " 4sc.

Row 5: " " " " 5 sc., " " " " " " " 5sc.

Row:6 " " " " 6 sc., " " " " " " " 6sc.

Row:7 " " " " 7sc., " " " " " " " 7sc.

Row:8 " " " " 8sc., " " " " " " " 8sc.

Continue the pattern and increasing in the centre sc until 30 rows have been worked.

Work 1dc., 1ch. around the edge of square, (1dc, 1ch, 1dc, 1ch, 1dc, 1ch) in each corner. Join with a sl. st. into first dc. Break off thread.

Join squares together with sc. to make a mat 6 squares wide by 6 squares long. Make a 2-3 in (5-7.5 cm) fringe around the edge.

Abbreviations ch. chain dc. double crochet sl. st. slip stitch
